The Commentaries: Interior Castle: A series of 15-minute videos of St. Teresa of Avila's work on prayer; good food for thought regarding the stages of prayer.

St. Katherine of Alexandria, Egypt, experienced God's grace to embrace Christ, leading her to confront the oppressive actions of Roman Emperor Maxentius, who persecuted Christians. Maxentius then attempted to force Catherine into a royal marriage, promising wealth and power in exchange for renouncing Christ. Catherine's unwavering commitment to Christ led her to decline, thus she found herself imprisoned. Soon Maxentius' wife and 200 soldiers converted to Christ. Maxentius ordered their execution. Catherine was first to be tied to a spiked wheel, but miraculously, the wheel shattered. Undeterred, her persecutors resorted to beheading. Saint Catherine's life is a testament to unwavering dedication to Christ, truth and justice. Her life serves as a powerful symbol of how civil authority, at times, opposes those who live virtuous lives of faith, but the enduring perseverance in goodness prevails. Her feast day is November 25th.

Thanksgiving: At every Mass, one of the most significant dialogues in human life occurs. The priest says, "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." The faithful respond, "It is right and just." And the priest replies with a saying of great theological depth: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, Lord, Holy Father, almighty and ever-living God." It's fitting to give thanks, "always and everywhere." It's appropriate for us to do so on sunny days or rainy ones, when we feel like a million bucks and or are in the hospital, when we are attending the weddings of loved ones or their funerals, when we get promotions at work or pink slips, when we win at games or when we get routed. Salvation, life itself, we boldly proclaim is a gift of God opening us to gratitude which, in turn, opens us up more to God's goodness. Thanking God, therefore, is our sweet duty.
